The PA Fish & Boat Commission requested a meeting with some PSA Board members to discuss possible stream and/or access improvement projects that could be done collaboratively. The meeting is tentatively scheduled for the end of January. I will keep everyone posted on what happens at this meeting.

The Fruit Basket program was discussed. Some of the issues were the costs (\$35.99 per basket x 92 baskets = \$3,311.18). Are the delivery maps that we currently use up-to-date? Should we develop a fundraiser to help pay for this program? We also discussed whether we should be gifting something else (gas cards or grocery store gift cards) other than fruit baskets. Interestingly, several of the teams took an informal poll during the deliveries on December 9th and found that all the landowners who were queried replied that they enjoyed receiving the fruit baskets and would prefer them over gas or gift cards. Ryan Novatnack is heading up this program and we will sit down with him to discuss some of the issues raised during the Board meeting and plan for December's Landowner Appreciation program.

The decision was made at the Board meeting to eliminate the August meeting this year. Everyone is still busy with picnics, vacations, golf, etc., during that time of the year. With tentative plans for a stream or access improvement project for this coming summer plus the July 20th Hot Dog Day there is plenty to keep PSA members busy and allow opportunities to interact with one another.

The Board also wanted to thank Rich Sherwin for all of the time and effort that he put into having the Fairview Gravel Pits Pond renamed as the Bob Hetz Memorial Pond and the ensuing dedication of the boulder with the new name on it on November 11th.

>>> LANDOWNERS FRUIT BASKET WRAP-UP

Keeping the tradition going with the landowners' fruit basket program, this year's delivery was split between 2 weekends. Eleven fruit baskets were delivered along Walnut and Elk Creek to property owners on Saturday, December 2nd. The rest (81) of the deliveries were done on Saturday, December 9th.

Members of the PA Steelhead Association, Gem City Outdoorsmen Fly Tiers, SONS of Lake Erie, 3CU, and NWTU delivered the 92 fruit baskets to property owners who allowed access to the tributaries through their property. This year, the beautiful baskets came from Mason Farms on the Peninsula Drive at \$35.99 each, for a total of \$3,311.18. Thank You, to the landowners who allowed access, and Thanks to those who volunteered to deliver the baskets!



>>> UPCOMING JANUARY MEETING OVERVIEW

he January 10th meeting will be a busy one. It is a combination meeting with the Northwest PA Chapter of Trout Unlimited. We did this last year at the January meeting, and it was well-received by members of both organizations. It is a way for each organization to educate the members of the audience about their mission and activities. Both the PSA and TU will give an overview of their programs.

The PSA is donating \$12,000 to Gannon University's Freshwater and Marine Biology degree program in memory of Bob Hetz. The check presentation will be made at this meeting. The PSA Board originally voted to create a scholarship in memory of Bob, but as we delved into the nuts-and-bolts of establishing a scholarship we realized that there were a lot of complexities and problems with doing so. As an alternative, the Board voted to make a one-time directed donation to the Freshwater and Marine Biology degree program at Gannon. This program educates college students in the areas of freshwater biology, water quality, and freshwater environmental issues (along with similar areas of study concerning marine environments). Our hope is that one of the graduates from this program will follow a career path that enables them to maintain and preserve the quality of Lake Erie, and subsequently our steelhead fishery, for many, many years into the future.

The director of the Freshwater and Marine Biology degree program, Dr. Christopher Dempsey, will give a brief overview of his program. Dr. Dempsey is excited about the PSA's donation and will put it to immediate use, including purchasing some much-needed equipment.

For those of you looking for that perfect fly rod and reel combination for steelhead fishing, then you don't want to miss the January PA Steelhead Association meeting on Wednesday, January 10th. A Redington Path fly fishing outfit that includes a 9'0" 7 wt. fly rod, reel, weight forward fly line, and traveling case, will be raffled off at the end of the meeting. Raffle tickets can be purchased at the door. All proceeds from the raffle will go to the Fruit Basket Landowner Appreciation Program fund. This fly-fishing outfit was generously donated by FishUSA.

>>> PSA \$12,000 GANNON DONATION

The PSA is donating \$12,000 to Gannon University's Freshwater and Marine Biology Degree Program in memory of Bob Hetz. The donation to the Gannon Freshwater and Marine Biology Program is a one-time, unrestricted donation. Dr. Chris Dempsey, the program director, already has some good ideas on how to use the money including buying some much-needed equipment and making small grants available to students in the program doing research. Dr. Dempsey will be one of the speakers at the January meeting and will give a short presentation on the Freshwater and Marine Biology Degree Program.

Gannon is so greatly appreciative of the PSA's Bob Hetz Memorial Donation to their FMB Degree Program. We placed NO restrictions on how the money is spent other than it had to be used to support the FMB Degree Program. We are planning to present the check at the January PSA / TU Combo meeting on January 10th. It will be at the American Legion.





>>> DONATION OF DAN HILL'S FISHING SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT

Dan Hill was a greatly admired and beloved gentleman of the local fishing community. He was an accomplished fly tier, fly fisherman, custom rod builder, and fly reel repairman specializing in Pfleuger Medalist reels. He fished far and near, including unusual places like Brazil, Bolivia, and Eastern Russia. Sadly, Dan passed away on September 10th, 2023. Many, many individuals within the PA Steelhead Association, Trout Unlimited, and Gem City Fly Tiers expressed their grief and sorrow over his loss.

Dan's widow, Colleen McCarthy, contacted Karl Weixlmann and asked him to take all the fishing supplies and equipment left behind by Dan's death. She donated the contents of 17 bins to be used by the various local fishing organizations. The bins contained a huge amount of fur, feathers, fly-tying equipment, thread, hooks, reels, sinkers, monofilament, and so on. The contents of the bins have been shared with several organizations: Trout Unlimited, Gem City Fly Tiers, Healing Waters, and the PA Steelhead Association. The PA Steelhead Association will raffle off some of the materials contained in several of the bins at our

I caught this feisty baby Steelhead in West Erie County just a couple of weeks ago! Pretty fan- tastic to see that natural reproduction is hap-pening in our creeks. I'm very curious if we could work as a group to count Redds in April and May-each Fall Spring Creek Trout Unlim ited in State College holds a "Redd Count" for Spring Creek Brown Trout. Obviously, with the vast amount of anglers traveling to Erie for Steelhead, coupled with the stocking of 1 mil- lion Steelhead annually, our fishery is realistically a put-grow-take fishery. However, that does not mean we should ignore the natural reproduction that has been happening in our creeks since the early 1900s. 3CU those feral Steelhead trapped descendants in the late 60s and then here we are today! - Ari Capotis

FISHING WITH CONFIDENCE

A while back I read something on the Dark Sky Fly fishing blog that stuck with me. It was an article about Fishing With Confidence. We all tend to experiment a lot with different fly patterns. I often go through phases like using streamers only or a specific nymph pattern or only egg patterns. Some seasons it is a specific tandem like the Little Precious and an egg pattern such as the 3 Loop Pink Lady or a Blood Dot. After I wrote an article in my top six confidence flies I noticed a lot of Pink Ladies in the trees around my favorite spots and they seem to lose some effectiveness. I started to think maybe the fish saw too many of them so Iswitched it up. I had lost some confidence in the fly. What is your confidence fly? The one that when you tie one on, you knew you'll catch a fish.

We all have favorite flies. My brother has flies that he uses with confidence that I don't. But often we can both be catching Steelhead while using completely flies. So what's the secret? Probably having confidence in your fishing abilities and in the fly you're using. Having that confidence in your fly can help you concentrate on getting a good drift and be ready for the

strike!

So if you are patient and confident in your fly AND your abilities to read the water and get a good drift, your should have success (if you are fishing over fish)! I really believe that you don't need a thousand-dollar rod or be able to cast 70' to be a successful Steelhead fisherman in our Steelhead Alley. I believe you need a decent reel with good low start-up inertia. What is startup inertia in a fly reel? Startup inertia is something you'll often hear relating to drag system performance. This term describes the force needed to start to pull the line off the spool. A drag with low startup inertia allows the drag to engage smoothly and without any noticeable pause or hesitation that could cause your line to break on a big fish. Other than that it is your ability to read the water flow and depth to figure out how much weight you need, and how far ahead of the fish you need to cast to get your fly down to their level in time.



That comes with experience and the more you fish the more confident you will become. There's that word again, "confidence" is an important ingredient to being a successful fly fisherperson! Get out there and Fish!

VETERANS PARK BROOD STOCKING ENDS?

Ten years ago almost to the day the PFBC started placing some of their brood stock in Veterans Park on Walnut Creek. It all started with a conversation I had with Fish Culturist Scot Fedei at a stream improvement project I volunteered for on W.C. It was at the old Cassidy Campground on the corner of Love and Zimmerly Roads. Millcreek Township had gotten a hold of the campground and was in the process of turning it into a park. I asked Scot "What do you do with the Brood Stock you take out of Avonia and Godfrey run after you are done with them"? He told me they put them back in Elk Creek and a few other places. I then asked why not Walnut since Elk has plenty of fish and few fish were making it up Walnut like they used to. (I used to catch fish behind the Millcreek Mall and all through the Asbury Woods area, but at that point they were only making it up during very high water events.)

Scot then proceeded to explain to me that broodstock can't be shot out of a tube from the truck like stocked browns because they are too big. They needed direct access to the stream to "slide" them in down a chute from a truck within 15' or so from the water.

Well. I mentioned this to fellow PA Steelhead Association member Rich Sherwin and he said "let's make it happen"! If you know Rich, once he decides to make something happen, he is a real bulldog! He doesn't stop until it gets done. So Rich set about getting the Millcreek Parks and Recreation Director Jim Sperry together with PFBC representatives including Scot Fedei. Pretty soon things start- ed to happen and an access road was put in at Veterans park. Pictured to the right are some of the first fish that made there way down the slide and in W.C., and a new phenomenon was born. Within a few years the crowds at the park the week or two after the brood stocking looked like a smaller version of the Wall at the Walnut Creek access area at the project waters.



VETERANS PARK BROOD STOCKING ENDS?

DID YOU FILL OUT YOUR STEELHEAD SURVEY TODAY?

>>> STEELHEAD ANGLER SURVEY LETTER

For the 3rd straight year, the PA Steelhead Association is managing an online survey about steelhead fishing in Pennsylvania. The first fishing season (fall 2021-spring 2022) we collected 408 surveys. The following fishing season (2022-23) we collected 475 surveys. We are opening up the survey again for the 2023-24 steelhead season.

The information from last season's survey was given to the Lake Erie Research Unit of the PA Fish & Deat Commission for analysis. The LERU will publish this information on the Fish Commission's website in the Biologist Reports Area 9 section. By comparing catch rates from year to year, this data may be helpful in monitoring the health of the fishery over time. The more surveys that are submitted, the more accurate the data.

We are encouraging everyone to fill out a survey every time that they fish for steelhead in northwest Pennsylvania --- whether you catch a fish or not. It only takes a minute or two to complete. You can use

your cell phone to access the survey via the following QR code:



iPhone cameras read QR codes and will get you connected to the survey. Most android phones require that you download a QR code reader app first in order to get connected. You can also access the survey through the following hyperlink: PSA Steelhead Survey 2023-24

You can save the link on your phone for easy access later on.

The survey asks for your email address which allows us to identify how many surveys were submitted by

individual anglers. Last year a total of 475 surveys were submitted by 164 anglers which averages out to 2.9 surveys per angler. Email addresses are required to fill out the survey but are only shared with the PA Fish & Doat Commission.

Some individuals have expressed concern that the PA Steelhead Association uses the survey to identify

the best places to fish on the tributaries for its members. The only information that the survey asks for is which stream that you fished --- nothing more specific than that. The only exception to this is whether you fished from the "Wall" or in the stream on Walnut Creek. When the Lake Erie Research Unit releases the survey analysis on the PA Fish & Doat Commission website, we will provide a link to the information on the PSA website and in our newsletter, Tight Lines.

Again, we are encouraging everyone who fishes for steelhead to fill out our Steelhead Fishing Survey --- whether they catch a fish or not.

KEEP AN EYE ON THE STREAMS

>>> STEELHEAD ANGLER SURVEY UPDATE

Please fill out a survey every time that you fish - even if you don't catch anything.

The survey was created by and is managed by the PA Steelhead Association. This information is shared with the Lake Erie Research Unit of the PA Fish & Boat Commission. The data is analyzed by the LERU to gather knowledge about the northwest Pennsylvania steelhead fishery. The results of the 2022-23 survey data analysis will be published on the PA Fish & Boat Commission website sometime in 2024.

You can access the survey by using the QR reader on your smart phone. Then save the web address on your phone for easy access in the future. Takes less than 2 minutes to fill out.





Catch and release concerns for winter fishing: It's not just extreme heat that can be fatal to fish!

Several winters ago, about the time I settled into wild trout country, I fell in love with winter fishing—the conditions, the solace, and the fish. For when the air turns cold, all but the hardiest abandon the water. The lucky angler may even find themselves soli- tary among mountains blanketed in white—the air aroar with the static of snowflakes crashing into Earth—and with an honest chance at a truly large trout that are relatively unpressured and intent on consuming the largest number of calories for the fewest expended. However, while fishing in the winter can be very productive and enjoyable, just like during the hot, low water summer and fall seasons, there are some off-unconsidered catch and release concerns specific to the frosty months that should be kept in mind when handling fish.

There's much debate within the fishing community over the ethics of fishing during specific times of the year and targeting fish during critical points in their life cycles. Handling Trout in Cold Weather Requires Special Care

When temperatures drop below freezing good catch-and-release practices become critical. We think of trout as needing special handling care when water temperatures are high, but fish are just as vulnerable when air temperatures are low. Mishandling fish in cold weather can easily be fatal.

Fish are, of course, cold-blooded. They're bodies do not produce heat like ours do and this leaves them especially vulnerable to frostbite. The fragile tissues of their gills can freeze in an instant when air temps are below freezing. Again, they have no body temperature to stabilize their cells, so it happens quickly.

We adapt very well to cold temperatures. We have evolved to survive wide temperature swings. Fish on the other hand have evolved in a world that never drops below freezing, so taking them out in the cold air is as alien to them as dropping us on the surface of Mars.

The solution is simple. Don't take fish out of the water when air temps are below freezing...

He would sort carefully through the box, selecting the perfect specimen, and passing it to Barrett, our guide. Barrett would give each fly a brief glance and toss it carelessly back across the table. Half as much," he'd say and go back to his drink."They're great flies," he went on, "and they'll catch fish, just not as many fish." The reason is pretty simple. Bulky flies with lots of materials look great, but they don't sink as quickly or as deep as sparse flies do. That's one of the reasons simple flies often catch the most fish...

>>> POPSICLE FLY PATTERN

When Steelhead first hit our local streams from Lake Erie, they are used to dining on baitfish. So when there are fresh fish and good water flow I like dead drifting or swinging baitfish imitations.

I have had a lot of success dead drifting Karl Weixlmann's Little Precious streamer, but when there is a little high water I like to fish something a little bigger. I have tied some different Intruder style patterns in the past, but this fly has movement properties without having to use a stinger hook.

It's called the Popsicle, obviously named for the tricolor orange, red and purple frozen treats from our youthful days. Large soft hackle marabou flies are an important weapon for the winter and early spring steelhead fly fisherperson.

George Cook was a guide, a casting instructor and a fly fishing industry representative. Cook is credited with coming up with the Popsicle back in the 80's during while guiding in Alaska. Fly tiers realized the value of marabou because of the way it moves in the water. Using marabou for salmon and steelhead flies has been done for decades. But by they keep evolving with the advent of a multitude of colors and flash materials.

With all the colors of marabou today, the number of possible color variations of popsicle-type flies is almost endless.



MEET THE FLY

Fly Type: Attractor wet fly steelhead pattern

Target Species: Steelhead and

Atlantic Salmon

Recommended Region: North

America for Atlantic Salmon/Steelhead

How to Fish: Wet fly swinging or dead drifting near the bottom

MATERIALS

<u>Hook:</u> Salmon Fly Hook Mustad 36890, Tiemco 7999, size 2-6

Thread: Red 0/6

Body: Silver Mylar tinsel, medium

<u>Hackle:</u> Marabou plumes: fluorescent orange, red, and purple.

Flash: 3 or 4 strands of Flashabou.


Adhesive: Head cement.



>>> STEP BY STEP INSTRUCTIONS:

Step 1. Pinch down the barb and get the hook secured in the vice.




Step 3. Use a 6 to 8 inch piece of medium sized silver Mylar tinsel. Tie it in just behind the return, silver side down so when you wrap it, it's easy to get the silver side up. If you have a rotary vise, use a couple of half hitches to secure the thread and then place the bobbin out of the way. Rotate your vise to spiral the tinsel down



the shank to the barb and back to the eye with slightly overlapping turns. If you don't have a rotary vise just wrap it by hand keeping steady pressure on the tinsel so it doesn't slip or sag. When you reach the hook return, tie the Mylar off securely and cut it close. Use a few more wraps to cover up the end.

Step 4. Select a single fluorescent orange marabou plume. Cut off the top third of the plume and pull a few fibers from either side of the stem. Pull the fibers back to ex- pose the tip, and then snip the tip off. With the pulled back fibers and stem in your fingertips take wraps around both to secure the plume to the hook. Use hackle pliers to get a hold of the butt end of the marabou and pull straight up. Here it helps to have a wet sponge available to wet your fingers to help to fold the fibers rearward as you wrap. Marabou can be hard to control the marabou, so wet fingertips can help to stroke the fibers back.

Step 5. Then begin taking wraps around the hook shank pulling the fibers back as you go. Use a couple of wraps to secure the stem to the shank of the hook and then snip the stem off close. Use a few nice tight wraps to finish securing the marabou to the hook.



Step 7. Now, working your way up the hook toward the eye, repeat the marabou wrapping process, first with red marabou and then with purple to finish. Whip finish to form a small smooth head and cut off the thread.

Step 8. Apply head cement to the wraps all the way around. Stroke the fibers back to free any that have been trapped.
